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PSC Authorizes FirstEnergy Vegetation Management Program

In an effort to improve electric reliability, the Public Service Commission of West Virginia today approved a comprehensive, end-to-end, time cycle based right-of-way vegetation management program (VMP) for Monongahela Power Company and Potomac Edison Company (Mon Power and PE).

West Virginia has been subject to several severe weather events, including the December 2009 Blizzard, the June 2012 Derecho, Hurricane Sandy in October 2012, and the winter storms experienced in 2013-2014, each of which left thousands of State residents without power for days, resulting in millions of dollars in damage, including spoiled food and countless accounts of discomfort, inconvenience and disruption of lives. Many customers faced multiple service disruptions over a three-year period.

In January 2013, the Commission ordered all electric utility companies operating in West Virginia to file a proposal for a comprehensive vegetation trimming program to maintain all rights-of-way over a proposed period of time. The proposals were to cover all distribution and transmission lines, be based on the utility's specific operational and reliability targets, indicate how the program would be coordinated with other entities that have facilities in the rights-of-way or attached to the utility poles, and include a proposed method for rate recovery of the increased costs associated with the programs.

The Commission stated in its Order that the Mon Power and PE VMP is expected to increase electric service reliability and lessen the impact and recovery time for service interruptions related to major weather events in the future. The Commission will, in the upcoming base rate case for the Companies, implement a cost recovery mechanism for the program. The approved costs will be subject to a periodic review and true up by the Commission to assure that only actual costs are included in the VMP.
